to him that WHITE was disloyal but oftentimes during office "bull sessions" WHITE would express views which to his, PALMER's, mind were not democratic. PALMER could not recall any specific statements made by WHITE but stated that they might be termed Socialistic.

PALMER, in summing up his opinion of WHITE, said he would not recommend WHITE because, in his opinion, WHITE had a "pink tinge" and was liberal in his thinking and in PALMER's opinion such an individual should not have a position of trust with the Government.

NEIGHBORHOOD

Mrs. ROBERT SEIGLE, [redacted] Dorchester, Massachusetts, stated she has known WHITE and his family for a period of fifteen years and during that time has never heard or observed anything that would indicate to her that ROBERT WHITE was a disloyal American.

Mr. HERBERT LEVINE, [redacted] Dorchester, Massachusetts, stated he has known WHITE and his family for a period of fifteen years and, although WHITE has not resided in that neighborhood for the past five years, LEVINE from his past association with WHITE believed him to be a loyal American.

MISCELLANEOUS

Boston Confidential Informants [redacted] both of known reliability, who are familiar with some phases of Communist Party, USA District No. 1, activities in the Boston-Cambridge, Massachusetts, area, stated they did not know ROBERT MAYER WHITE.

CREDIT

The files of the Credit Bureau of Greater Boston, Inc., 11 Beacon Street, Boston, Massachusetts, failed to reveal any information pertinent to the loyalty of ROBERT M. WHITE.

CRIMINAL

The files of the Massachusetts Board of Probation, Boston, Massachusetts, a central repository for criminal records in Massachusetts, contained no record for ROBERT M. WHITE. RUC.
